Service Learning - Soldier Care Package Collection Drive

This year, the Army JROTC Colonial Battalion will again be sponsoring a collection drive for soldiers stationed overseas. The collection drive will begin in December and end on January 31, 2013. The homeroom that shows the most support will win a pizza or ice cream sundae party.

Soldier care packages are boxes with essentials and snack foods. The JROTC cadets try to encourage their classmates to bring in various items by sponsoring a contest between the homerooms. Each box sent out will also contain a letter from a cadet in the battalion.

As of the first week in the competition, Mrs. McMinn's homeroom is in first place with 385 items. Sergeant First Class Harmon's is in second with 142 items, third place is Mr. Dunham's with 82 items and fourth place is Mrs. Wolfe's with 49 items.

Listed below are examples of the types of items we are collecting. Please help support the troops and bring in some of the following items:

Food:

Applesauce, gum, mints, chips, pretzels, cookies, crackers, instant coffee, tea, oatmeal, oodles o' noodles, pop-tarts, cereal, granola bars, jerky, non-perishables, etc.

Clothing:

Black or white socks, sweatpants, sweatshirts, t-shirts and washcloths.

Entertainment:

Batteries, disposable cameras, envelopes, paper, pens, pencils, playing cards, pocket games, paperback books, puzzle books, flashlights, DVDs, etc.

Personal Hygiene:

Chapstick, combs, dental floss, mouthwash, female hygiene products, foot powder, hand sanitizer, hand and body lotion, soap, stick deodorant, toilet paper, toothpaste, tooth brushes, etc.

Community Service and Involvement




Project Bundle Up

A call was made to the Albert Gallatin High School Army JROTC Colonial Battalion to see if we could help out. The collection drive was scheduled to be held for three days; Friday, November 16th from 12 p.m. to 6 p.m., Saturday, November 17th from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. and Sunday November 18th from 12 p.m. to 6 p.m.

There were seven High School JROTC programs that competed in the event. Those schools consisted of: Laurel Highlands High School, Lincoln High School, Northern Garrett High School, Southern Garrett High School, Preston High School, Wayne County High School and Albert Gallatin High School.

Albert Gallatin High School Colonial Battalion placed second in the Unarmed Platoon Drill Competition. In the individual knockout competition, C/LTC Megan Gilmore placed fourth. The knockout competition consisted of over 100 participants.

Northern Garrett Drill Competition

On Saturday, November 17, 2012, the Albert Gallatin High School JROTC Drill Team ventured to Garrett County Community College in Maryland to participate in our second drill competition in this school year. Four teams came together for a day of healthy rivalry, friendly supervisors, and excellent food. The four high schools, excluding ourselves, were Northern and Southern Garrett, and Preston County.

The team arrived at six o' clock in the morning, dressed in their prime and proper Class A uniforms, showing wonderful dedication and discipline to their teams, themselves, and the whole battalion all the while looking smart.

The competition went well, all teams putting their best effort in and coming in the top three. Both Armed and Unarmed Squad came out on top of the game, both teams arriving in first place. Mock Inspection

On Tuesday, November 20, 2012, the Colonial Battalion attended a training day in the high school gymnasium to prepare for the upcoming inspection in February. SFC Harmon contacted the recruiting office and several recruiters attended from the Army, Air Force and the Marines.

A formal inspection has a sequence that must be followed. First the CSM (command sergeant major) falls in the battalion. Each company gets accountability of all their members. Attendance is an essential aspect of the inspection. The company commanders and platoon leaders take charge of their company and platoons and the battalion commander, c/LTC Megan Gilmore leads the battalion in reciting the battalion motto and the cadet creed.

Finally the battalion is then prepared for the inspection, as the command of open ranks is given. The recruiters, acting as the inspecting officers, ask each cadet questions from a list of inspection questions, the chain of command and inspect each cadets uniform for deficiencies.

After the inspection of each cadet was complete, there were other activities scheduled during our training day. A drill competition between platoons was held using the inspection sequence, with c/CSM Emilee Kephart judging each platoon. c/CPT Lloyd Drake and c/CPT Doug VanDivner conducted a class on uniform wear and proper placement of ribbons and awards. In addition, all cadets were given another opportunity to go before a promotion board.



Although the day was stressful, it paid off in the end. The LET 1 cadets experienced their first battalion formation and learned what was involved in conducting a battalion inspection and the staff learned what needed to be improved prior to our actual inspection in February.

We ask that **ALL** cadets attend the inspection in February and be sure to **STUDY!**
