Pennsylvania's New High School Graduation Requirements

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Important Legislative Changes

On January 8, 2010, following approvals by the state's Independent Regulatory Review Commission and the Attorney General, the State Board of Education published changes to Chapter 4 that set stronger, more consistent high school graduation requirements for students, beginning with the class of 2015 – this year's 8th graders.





Graduation Requirements

School district graduation policies must at least include:



COMPLETION OF COURSES & GRADES



COMPLETION OF CULMINATING PROJECT



PROFICIENCY IN EACH STATE STANDARD



PROFICIENCY IN EACH MAIN SUBJECT AS DETERMINED BY:

- State-developed Keystone Exam Counting as at Least 33% of Course Grade OR
- Independently-validated Local Assessment OR
- Keystone Exam as a Stand-alone Graduation Requirement OR
- Advanced Placement (AP) or International Baccalaureate (IB) Exam







Pennsylvania's New High School Graduation Requirements



STAND ALONE GRADUATION REQUIREMENT

Allows the district discretion on how to weight the assessment in course grades.

Use as final exam (20% vs. 33%)





Graduation Policy Phases: WHO?? WHEN??

PHASE ONE: Students graduating in 2015 and 2016 must demonstrate proficiency in:

- English Composition (9)
- English Literature (10)
- Algebra I
- Biology

PHASE TWO: Students graduating in 2017 and beyond must demonstrate proficiency in:

- Both English Composition and Literature
- Two of three Mathematics (Algebra I, Algebra II, or Geometry)
- One of two Sciences (Biology or Chemistry)
- One of three Social Studies (American History, Civics and Government or World History)

Algebra II, Geometry, English Composition	Spring 2011	Winter 2011-2012
U.S. History	Fall 2012	Spring 2013
Chemistry, Civics and Government, World History	Spring 2015	TBD

Alignment to National Standards

- Keystone Exams align with:
 - Common Core State Standards, adopted July 1, 2010
 - English Language Arts
 - Mathematics
 - PA Academic Standards
- Test questions for the Keystone Exams will be guided by Eligible Content on the Standards Aligned System website (www.pdesas.org)







100-Point Scale

Each Keystone Exam is graded on a 100-point scale. To satisfy the graduation Requirements, students must score either *Proficient* or *Advanced*.

Performance Level	Points
Below Basic- no points toward course, graduation requirement not satisfied	0-49
Basic- points earned are awarded, but graduation requirement not satisfied	50-69
Proficient- points awarded, graduation requirement satisfied	70-89
Advanced - points awarded, graduation requirement satisfied	90-100







Test Format

Keystone Exam Questions:

- Includes multiple-choice questions and constructed-response, or open-ended questions.
- Algebra I and Biology: 60%-75% of the total score from multiple-choice questions and;
 25%-40% of the total score from constructed-response questions
- English 20% of the total score will come from multiple-choice, and 80% from constructedresponse questions

Keystone Exam Scoring:

- Each correct multiple-choice question is worth one point
- Partial credit could be given on constructed-response questions, depending on the rubric

Keystone Exam Format:

Online and paper/pencil formats available for all Keystone Exams

Item and Scoring Sampler:

- Sample questions and scoring for each Keystone Exam are available to help prepare both students and teachers.
- The Item and Scoring Samplers include:
 - Multiple-choice and constructed-response practice questions
 - Examples of how constructed-response questions will be scored
- Available on the SAS website (<u>www.pdesas.org</u>)







Retesting

Students can take the Keystone Exam up to 3 times per school year.

- Students who don't score 'proficient' can retake the entire test or just the module they didn't pass
 - SEPTEMBER, DECEMBER, MAY
- Retesting scoring will be based on the highest module scores, so it is in the best interest of the student to retake the entire Keystone Exam
- If a student has not achieved proficiency after 2 attempts, he/she can complete a project-based alternative to demonstrate his/her knowledge in the subject matter







Project-Based Assessment

A student who does not achieve proficiency on a Keystone Exam after 2 attempts will be eligible to complete a project-based assessment.

Projects will be:


- Aligned with Keystone Exam modules
- Developed by the department and administered by school staff
- Scored by regional panels of educators

WHAT IS COVERED??

Freshman Seminar is divided into two 9 week modules:

- Personal Development
- Self-Management

Students learn:

- time management
- conflict resolution
- self-advocacy skills

Freshmen are also afforded opportunities to practice communication skills that help them diffuse social dilemmas and cope with peer pressure..
